

Community Supervision Admissions

Admissions to community supervision totaled **83,293** for FY 2016-17, a slight increase over last fiscal year.

Most offenders are male (72.6%), white (62.6%) and between the ages of 25-34 (35.1%). Most (54.1%) had never been on felony supervision in Florida before, and 35% are on probation for a property-related crime, like burglary or theft, or for a drug-related crime (29.6%). The majority of offenders are sentenced to third (69.4 %) or second (17.3%) degree felonies. Their average sentence length is 2.4 years. Only 8.5% of community supervision admissions came directly from prison to supervision; the rest are serving an original community supervision sentence. The top three counties of admission are Broward (8.0%), Hillsborough (7.9) and Miami-Dade (6.5%).

Supervision admissions refer to the number of offenders beginning a new period of community supervision by the Department of Corrections. This may be the result of either a new offense or a revocation of a previous supervision period. It does not include offenders already on supervision who receive an additional sentence for an offense different from the one that initially placed them on supervision.

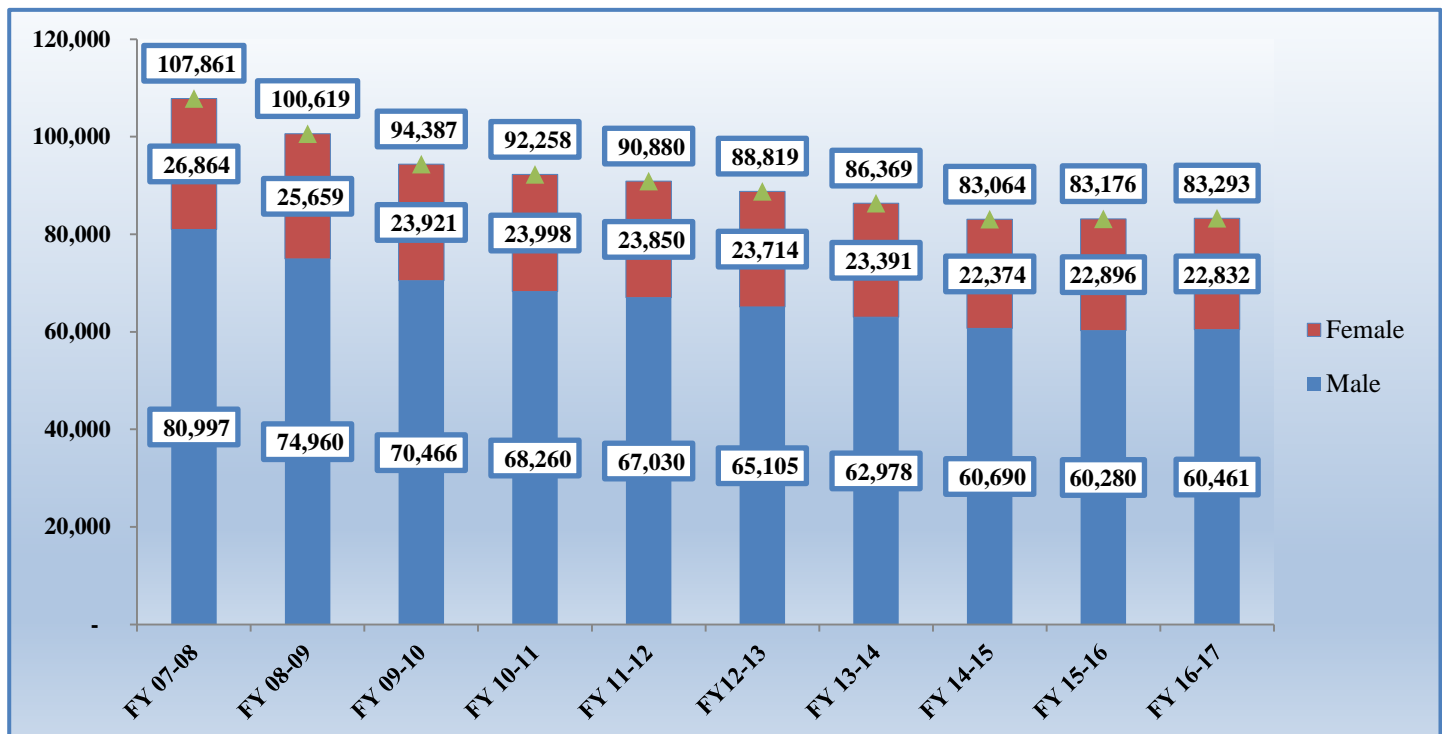
Community Supervision Admissions increased almost 0.1% in Fiscal Year 2016-17

Supervision sentences include:

- * an original sentence by the court to probation, community control or a pretrial intervention program, or
- * the supervision portion of a “split” sentence – prison followed by community control or probation, or
- * assignment to supervision as a condition of prison release, or
- * offenders from other states that Florida supervises through Interstate Compact agreements.

The following tables and charts describe offenders admitted to supervision from July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017. Other years are sometimes featured to illustrate trends. For example, as the table below illustrates, community supervision admissions increased by 0.1% from last fiscal year.

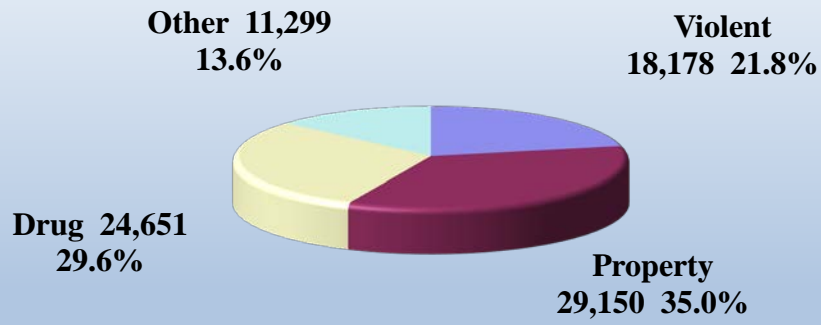

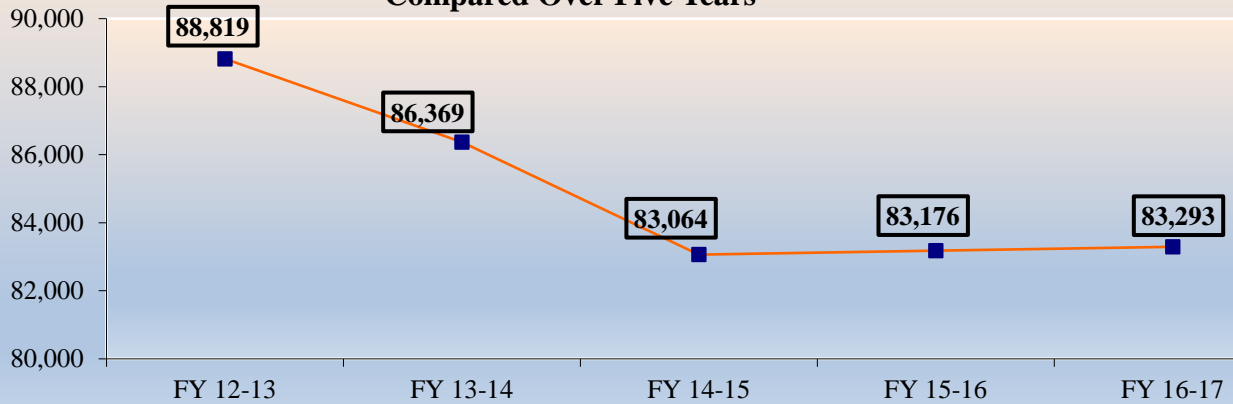

Community Supervision Admissions

More than Half of those on Community Supervision (52.8%) Admitted for Felony Probation

Only 8.5% of the fiscal year Community Supervision admissions came directly from prison; the rest are serving original sentences.

During FY 2016-17, the majority of offenders serving an original sentence were admitted to community supervision for probation (50,408) or 60.5% of total admissions), pretrial intervention (10,646 or 12.8%), or drug offender probation (9,260 or 11.1%).

Conditional release accounted for 5,185 (6.2%) of the post release supervision admissions, followed by addiction supervision (986 or 1.3%) and parole (870 or 1%).

Community Supervision Admissions

Average Age of Offenders Admitted to Community Supervision was 33.8

Less than one percent of offenders admitted to community supervision in FY 2016-17 were 17 years or younger (0.3%), and about one quarter (25.0%) were under 25 years old.

Pre-trial Intervention cases have the lowest average age (30.5) of all community supervision types; and "other post-prison" offenders (50.6 years old) and conditional release offenders (42.3 years old) have the highest average ages.

Admissions by County of Conviction

This table represents the 67 counties in Florida, along with "other state" cases accepted under the Interstate Compact Agreement. The county of conviction for the primary offense, shown here, may not be the same as the county where the offender is ultimately supervised. The top five counties of admission are Broward (8.0%), Hillsborough (7.9%), Miami-Dade (6.5%), Orange (5.4%) and Polk (5.1%).

Admissions by Circuit of Conviction

Felony cases are processed through judicial circuits. A circuit can consist of one large city and its surrounding county or counties (Circuit 11: Miami-Dade) or several smaller counties (Circuit 3: Columbia, Dixie, Hamilton, Lafayette, Madison, Suwannee and Taylor counties). This table shows the circuit in which the offenders were sentenced for their most serious offenses.

Admissions by Felony Classification

Felony class for the primary offense is the same even when offenders were convicted of attempts, which explains why some capital and life felony cases are on supervision rather than in prison. Others are offenders who served prison sentences followed by a period of supervision such as parole or conditional release. Most offenders were sentenced to third (69.4%) or second (17.3%) degree felonies.

The primary offense is the most serious crime for which the offender was admitted to supervision, based on the statutory degree of the crime. Offenders may also be serving sentences concurrently (at the same time) for other offenses. The offender may have been convicted as an accessory, or for conspiracy or an attempt, rather than as a principal for this offense.

* The largest category of offenders were admitted for drug offenses (29.6%) followed by theft, forgery, fraud crimes (26.5%).

* The largest single offense type for which the most offenders were admitted to supervision in FY 2016-17 was drug possession (19,152 or 23.0%).

* Murder/manslaughter, sex offenses, robbery, and violent personal offenses accounted for about one-fifth of all supervision admissions (21.4%).

* The weapons category (which includes discharging weapons and possessing weapons) amounts to about 3.0% of all admissions and the "Other Offenses" category (which includes DUI without injury, traffic and other non-violent offenses) constitutes 10.2% of all supervision offender admissions in FY 2016-17.

Community Supervision Admissions

This table represents the primary offense for which an offender was sentenced to community supervision in FY 2016-17. Of the nine major offense categories listed, most offenders were sentenced for drug offenses (29.6%) followed closely by property offenses like theft, forgery or fraud (26.5%). Only 0.6% of offenders were sentenced for murder or manslaughter, and those offenses include attempts.

Community Supervision Admissions

Average Sentence Length for Community Supervision Admissions is 2.4 years

The majority (64.1%) of those admitted to community supervision during FY 2016-17 are serving sentences of two years or less.

The average sentence length for all those admitted to community supervision in FY 2016-17 is 2.4 years.

Those admitted to parole in FY 2016-17 are serving an average sentence length of 5.6 years, while those on pretrial intervention serve an average of 1.3 years.

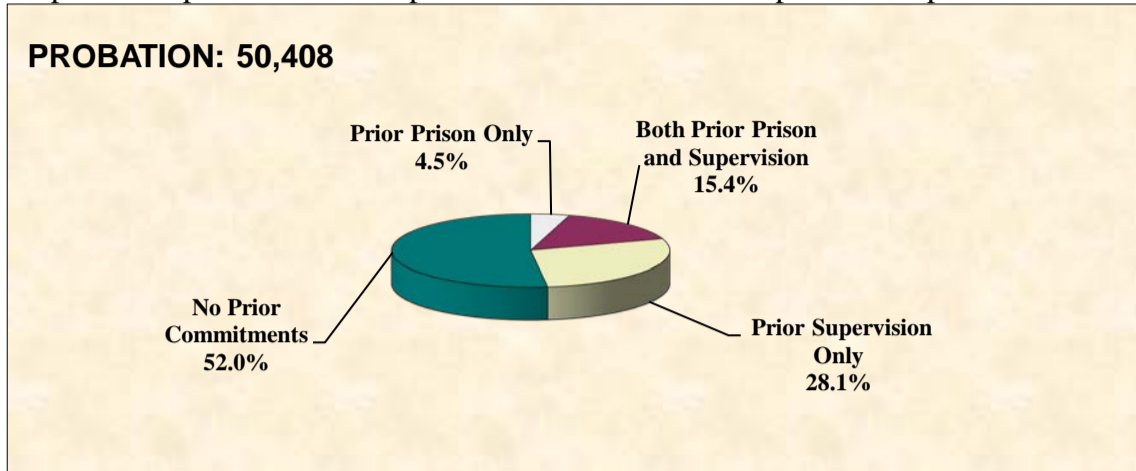

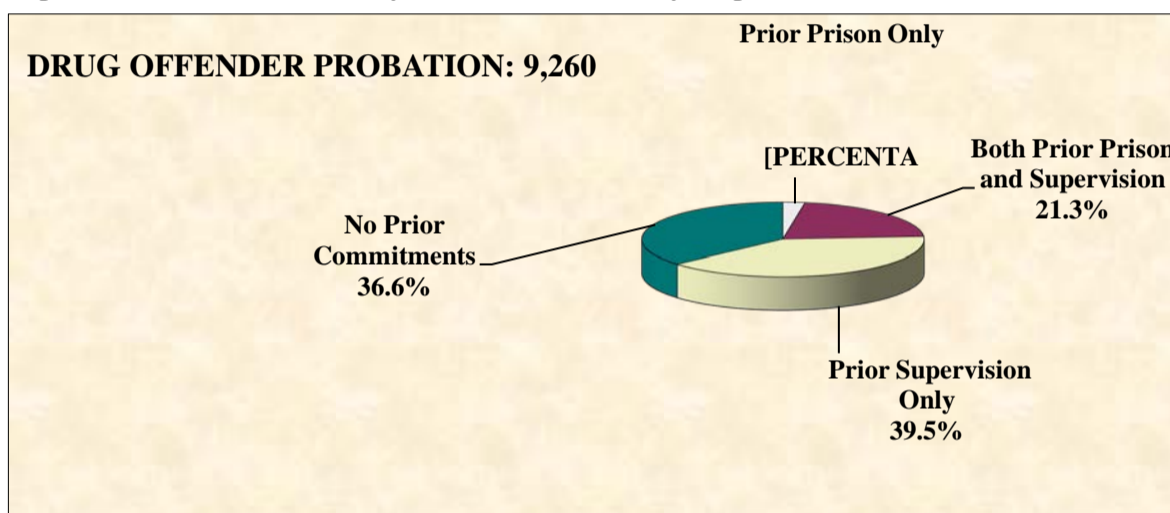

Total Prior Commitments by Type of Supervision

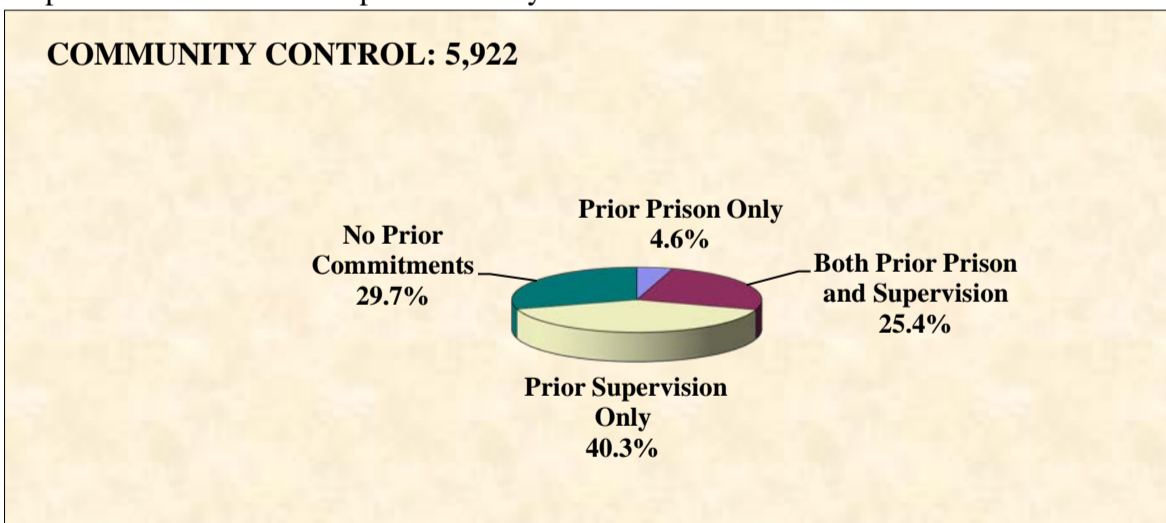
Slightly over half (52.0%) of those admitted to community supervision in FY 2016-17 and placed on probation had no prior commitments to either prison or supervision.



Of those admitted to Drug Offender probation in FY 2016-17, most had supervision commitments only (39.5%), followed by no prior commitments (36.6%).



Seven of ten (70.0%) of the offenders admitted to community supervision in FY 2016-17 and placed on community control had either no prior commitments or prior commitments to supervision only.

Probation Officers Who Supervise Sex Offenders and Predators Have Specialized Training

The Public Safety Information Act (PSIA), which became law on October 1, 1997, broadened public access to the records of sexual predators and sex offenders. An offender can be designated a sexual predator if he or she commits certain statutorily-defined sex crimes that are first degree felonies or greater, or if he or she commits two or more second-degree or greater felony sex offenses, as provided in section 775.21, Florida Statutes. In either case, the offense had to have been committed on or after October 1, 1993. An offender is a sex offender if he or she has been convicted of certain sex crimes listed in section 943.0435(1)(a), Florida Statutes, regardless of the date of offense. Both sexual predators and sex offenders are subject to registration and community notification. It should be noted that some of the sex offenders on supervision previously served state prison time for their offenses.

Sex offenders and sexual predators are supervised by probation officers with specialized training. Most of these offenders are subject to special conditions of supervision, and they are supervised at a higher level than regular probation offenders. Some of these offenders are also subject to statutorily-defined specific conditions of sex offender probation or sex offender community control. Some examples of special conditions may include offenders not being allowed to reside within 1,000 feet of a school, playground, or daycare center, or offenders being required to submit to DNA testing, sex offender treatment, or counseling.

The table below shows that in FY 2016-17, Circuit 9 (Orlando) sentenced the most sex offenders to community supervision, 238 or 10.2%, followed by Circuit 4 (Jacksonville) with 193 or 8.3% and Circuit 5 (Tavares) with 174 or 7.5%.
