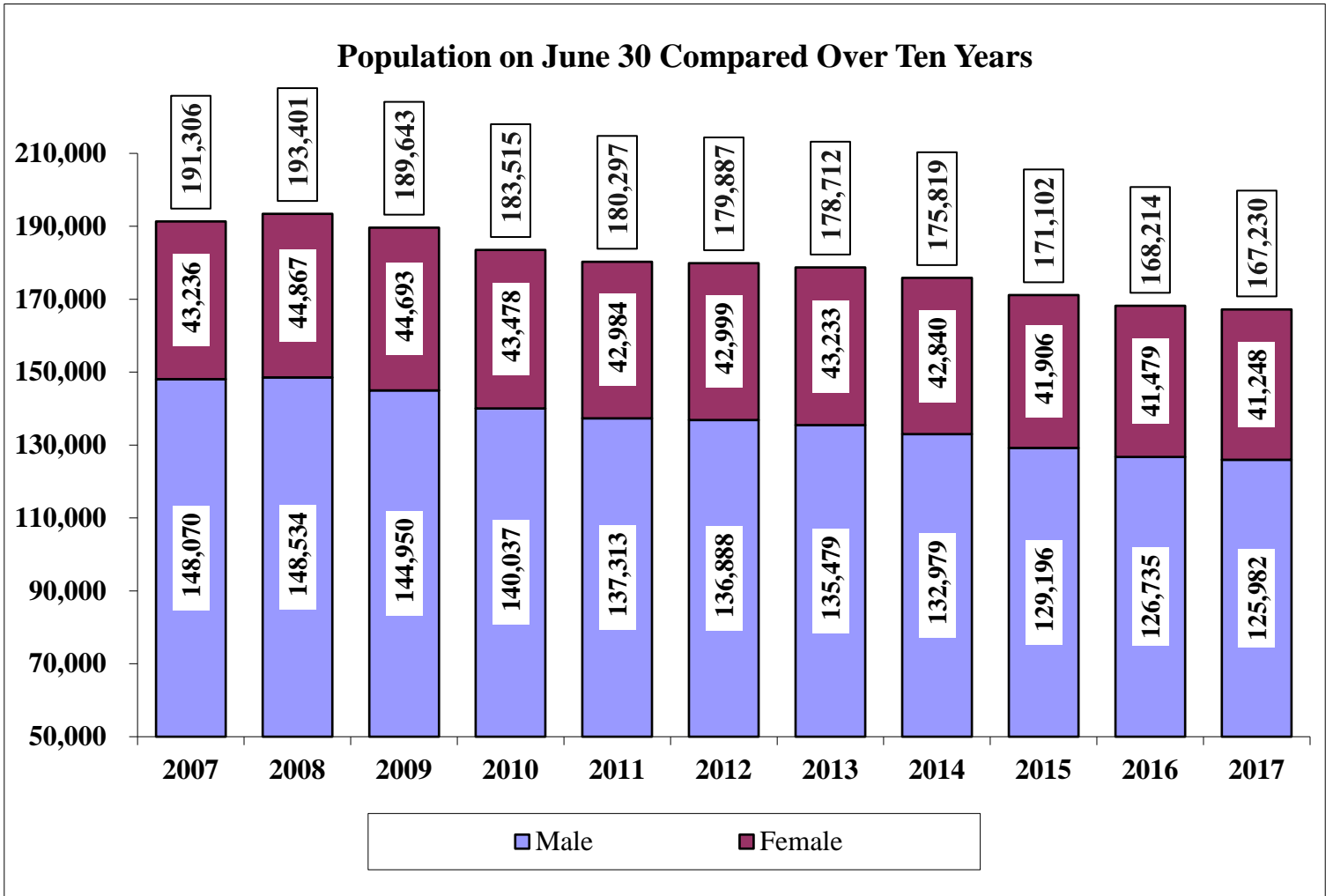


Community Supervision Population

Summary of Community Supervision Population on June 30, 2017

For any specified date, the community supervision offender population consists of all offenders actively under supervision and those on supervision caseload but temporarily unavailable for direct supervision because of known and designated reasons, such as hospitalization or incarceration.

Statistics on offender population are those for June 30, the final day of the fiscal year. The table below shows that there was a .58% decrease in the community supervision population over the last fiscal year.

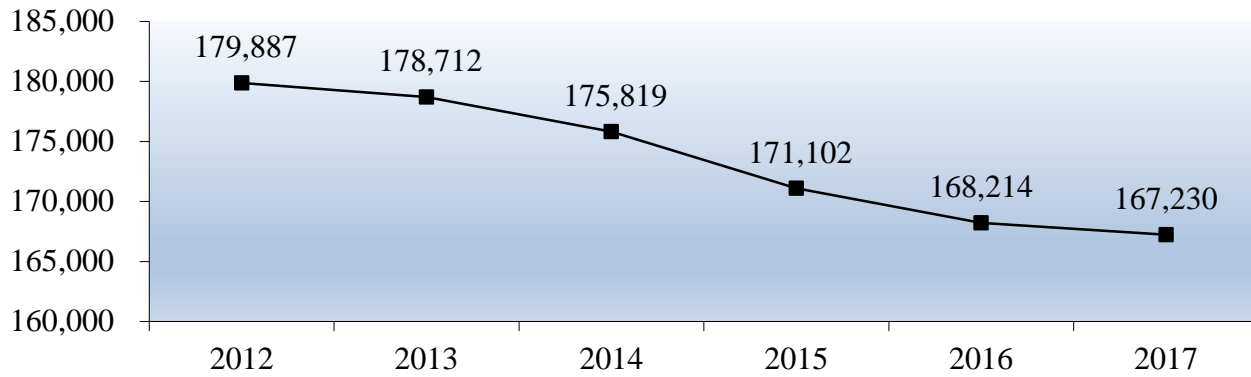

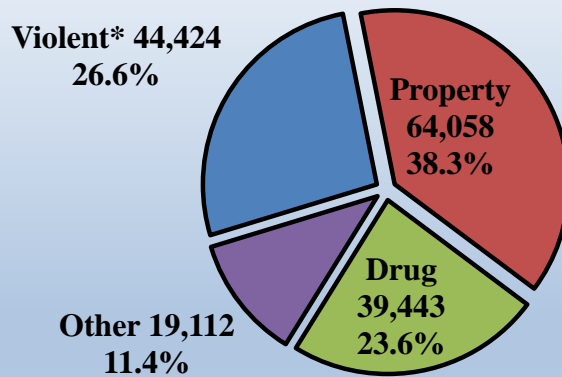

Felony Probation Most Common Type of Supervision

The majority (65.2%) of offenders serving an original sentence on community supervision on June 30, 2017, were serving felony probation.

The majority of those on post-prison supervision on June 30, 2017 were serving parole (36.0%) or conditional release (57.1%) terms.

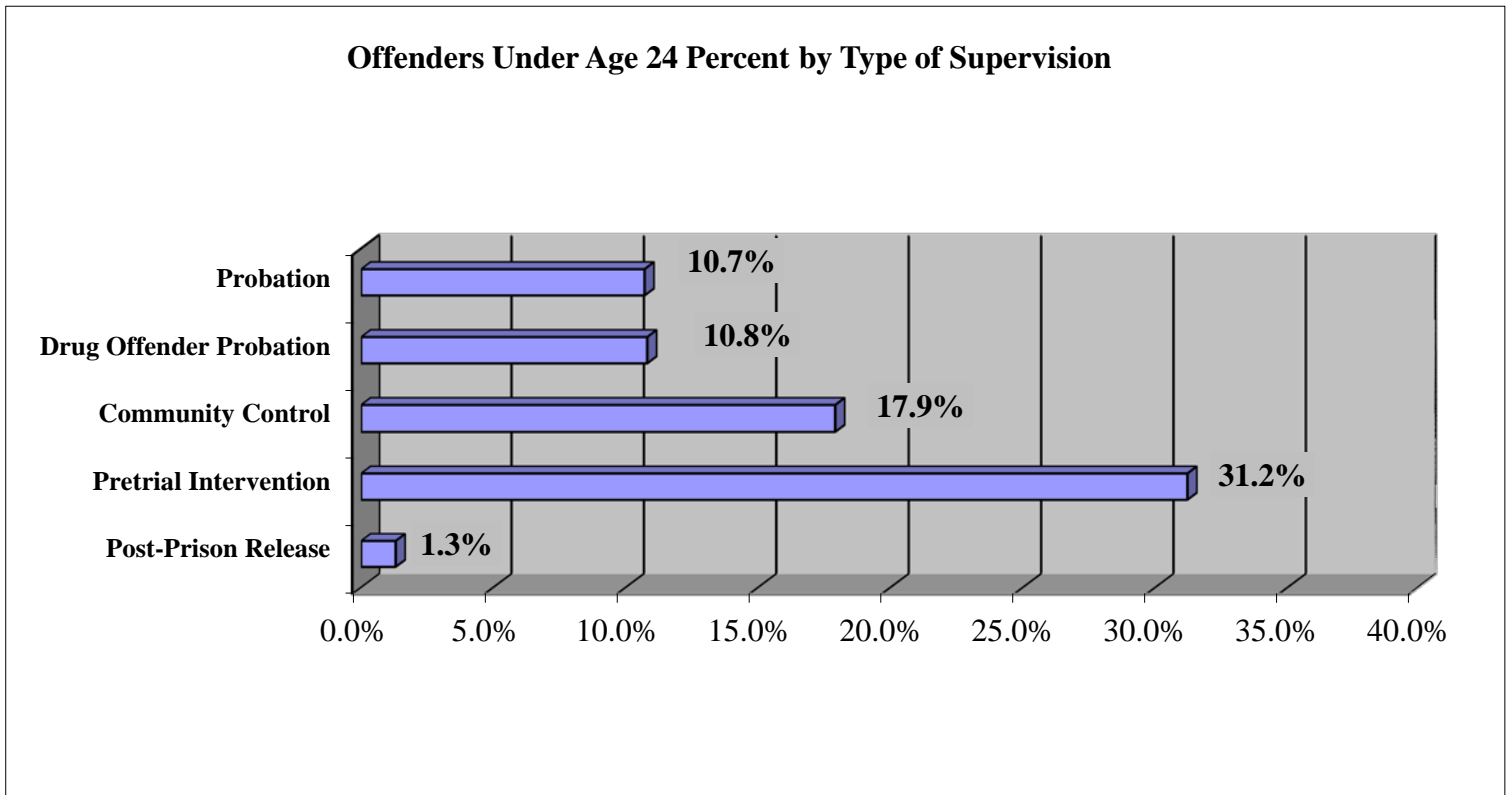

Community Supervision Population

Offenders on community supervision are generally considered Youthful Offenders if they are under the age of 24. Correctional Probation Senior Officers often supervise youthful offenders because they are generally more difficult to supervise than older offenders. Further, the experienced officer is better qualified to address the range of problems that Youthful Offenders present. About one-third of all offenders on pretrial intervention community supervision on June 30, 2017 were Youthful Offenders, significantly more than any of the other sentence categories.

Note: The bars below are discrete categories so they do not total 100%.

Ex: Of the 15,733 offenders on drug probation, 12% were under age 24.



Community Supervision Population

Average Age of Population was 38.7 Years

The overall average age of community supervision offenders on June 30, 2017 was 38.7 years.

Those on pretrial intervention had the youngest average age (31) for a specific type of community supervision on June 30, 2017.

Those on control release had the oldest average age (57 years).

Approximately 1.8 percent of the offenders on community supervision on June 30, 2017, were age 70 or older.

Population by Circuit of Supervision June 30, 2017

Felony cases are processed through judicial circuits. A circuit can consist of one large city and its surrounding county or counties (Circuit 13, Tampa: Hillsborough or several smaller counties - Circuit 5, Tavares: Citrus, Hernando, Lake, Marion, and Sumter counties). The table below shows the circuit where the offender is supervised. The two circuits with the highest number of offenders under supervision on June 30, 2017 were Circuit 17 - Ft. Lauderdale with 17,235 (10.3%) and Circuit 11 - Miami with 16,555 (9.9%). Circuit 16 - Key West is the smallest, with around one percent of the total supervised population.

Community Supervision Population

Felony class for the primary offense is the same even when offenders were convicted of attempts, which explains why some capital and life felony cases are on supervision rather than in prison. Others are offenders who served prison sentences followed by a period of supervision such as parole or conditional release.

The primary offense is the most serious crime for which the offender was admitted to supervision, based on the statutory degree of the crime. Offenders may also be serving sentences concurrently (at the same time) for other offenses. The offender may have been convicted as an accessory, or for conspiracy or an attempt, rather than as a principal for this offense.

The majority (104,237 or 62.5%) of those on community supervision on June 30, 2017, had third degree felonies. The next largest felony class was second degree, with 38,148 or 22.9% of all those on community supervision that day.

The largest category of offenders on community supervision on June 30, 2017 was for property offenses (38.4%). The percentage of those on supervision that day for drug crimes was 23.6% and 26.6% on supervision for violent crimes, which include actual, attempted and conspiracy to commit

The largest single offense type for which the most offenders were on community supervision on June 30, 2017, was drug possession (25,934 or 15.5%), followed by grand theft, other (19,956 or 11.9%).

The “other” category includes DUI No Injury, Traffic, Other and other non-violent offenses, and constituted only 8.5% of all community supervision offenders on June 30, 2017.

Average Sentence Length for those on Community Supervision on June 30, 2017, is 4.2 years.

The majority (60.8%) of those on community supervision on June 30, 2017, were serving sentences of three years or less, with over a quarter of those falling between one and two years (29.4%).

The average sentence length for those on community supervision on June 30, 2017, was 4.2 years.

Those on parole on June 30, 2017, were serving the longest sentences with an average sentence length of 16.7 years, while those on addiction recovery supervision were serving the shortest with an average of 0.7 years.

Of the 2,255 offenders on parole, 456 are serving life sentences on parole.

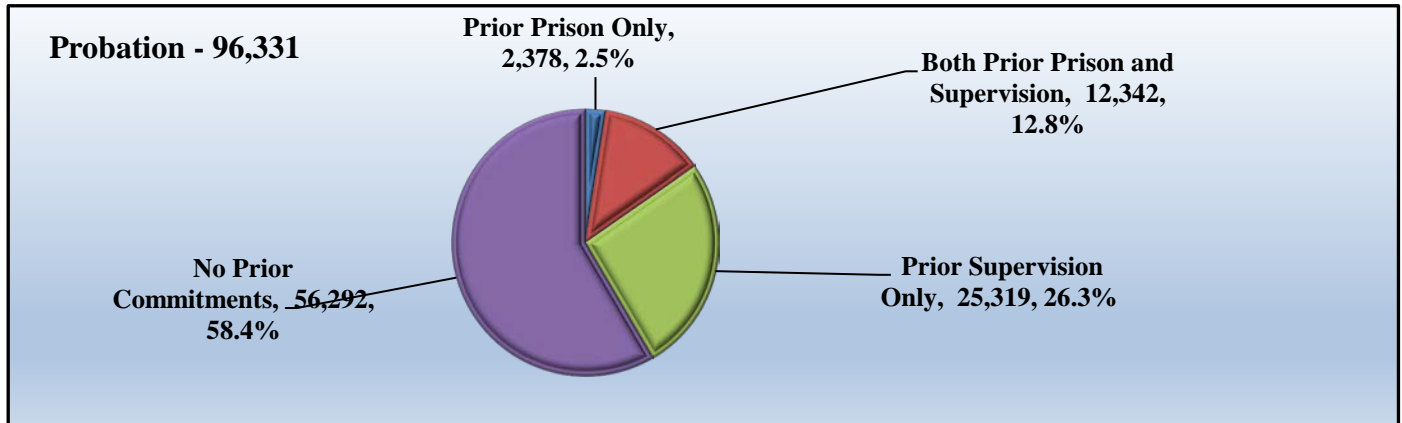

Probation: 96,331

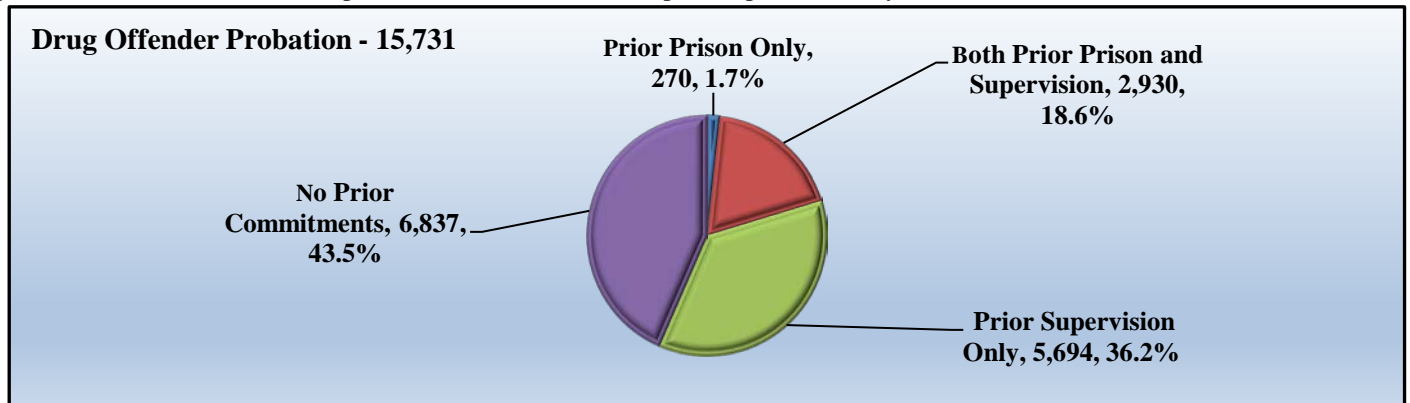
Probation is the single largest category of community supervision, comprising 70.9% of all offenders on supervision. More than half (58.4%) of those on community supervision on June 30, 2017, for probation had no prior commitments to either state prison in Florida or state supervision in Florida.

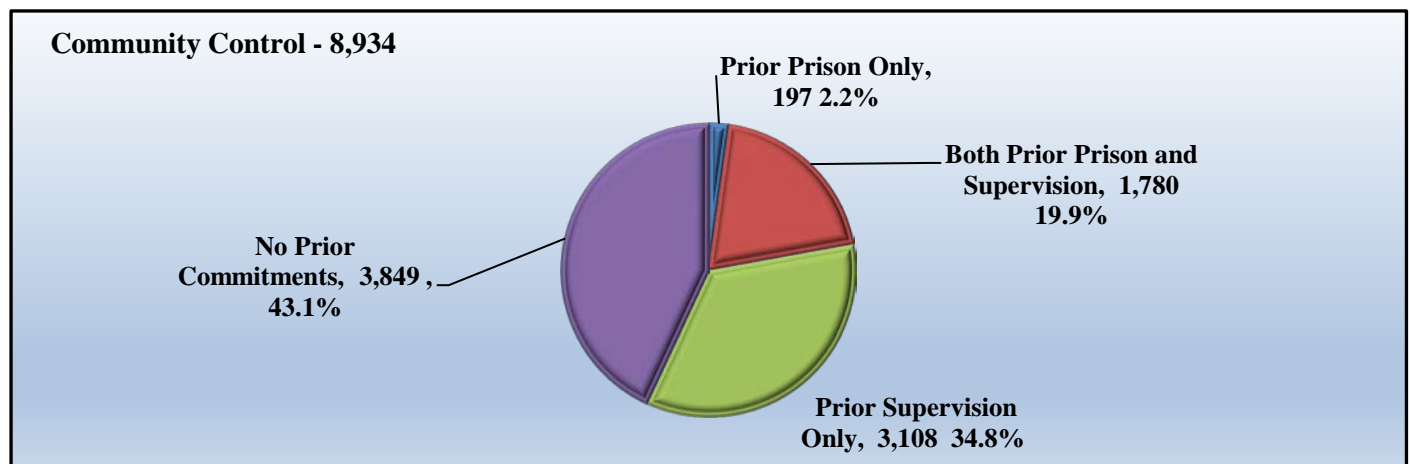
Of those offenders on Drug Offender probation on June 30, 2017, almost half of the offenders had no prior commitments (43.5%) compared to over a third who had prior supervision only commitments (36.2%).

Of the offenders on Community Control on June 30, 2017, 34.8% had prior commitments of the supervision type only, and 43.1% had no prior supervision or prior Florida state prison commitments.

Community Supervision Population

The Sexual Predator Act became law on October 1st, 1993. This first-in-the-nation registration law was followed by the Public Safety Information Act (PSIA), which became law on October 1, 1997, and broadened public access to records of sexual predators and sex offenders.

What's the difference between a Sexual Predator and a Sex Offender?

An offender can be designated a sexual predator only by the court system. They are designated as such if the offender commits certain statutorily defined sex crimes that are first degree felonies or greater, or if he or she commits two or more 2nd degree or greater felony sex offenses as provided in section 775.21, Florida Statutes.

An offender is a sex offender if he or she has been convicted of certain sex crimes listed in section 943.0435(1)(a), Florida Statutes and was still serving any part of their sentence on or after October 1st, 1997.

Both sexual predators and sex offenders are subject to registration and community notification, but sexual predators usually have to register more frequently than sex offenders. It should be noted that some of the sex offenders and predators on supervision previously served state prison time for their offenses.

How are they treated differently from other probationers?

Sex offenders and sexual predators are supervised by probation officers with specialized training. These offenders must comply with additional conditions of supervision provided in statute and are supervised at a higher level than regular probation offenders. Some examples of sex offender conditions imposed include sex offender treatment, curfew, and certain sex offenders (with minor victims) not being allowed to reside within 1,000 feet of a school, or child care facility.

The table below shows that on June 30, 2017, the population of sexual predators and offenders was overwhelmingly male (98.0%) and distributed fairly evenly across all twenty of Florida's judicial circuits. While the percentages suggest that these offenders are more prevalent in large, urban circuits (Orlando, Miami, Jacksonville, and Tampa), the percentage of the circuit's caseload (total number of offenders under community supervision) that is made up of sexual predators and offenders is distributed equally.
