### Inmate Admissions Decrease approximately 5% for FY 2016-17 from Last Fiscal Year

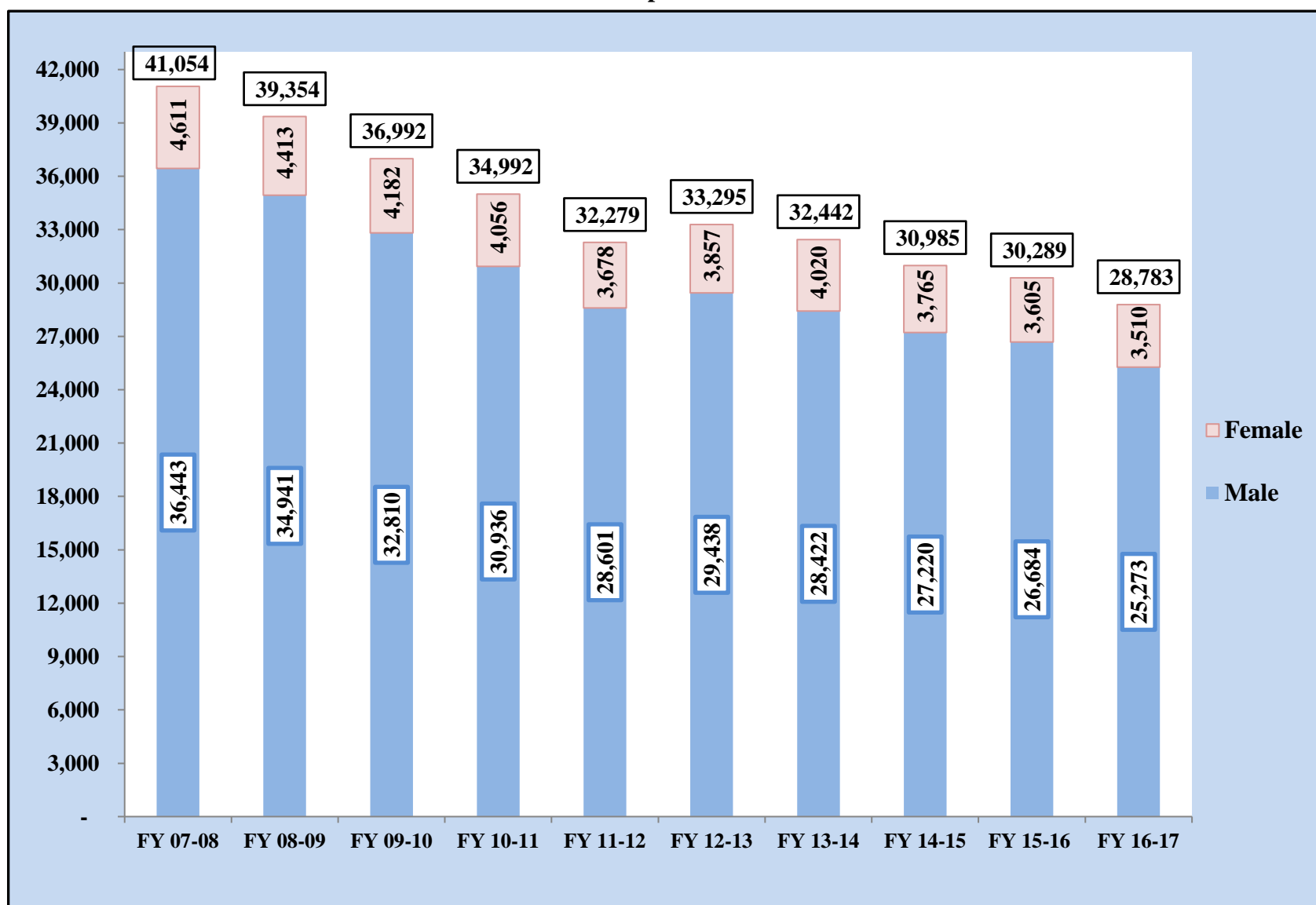
Inmate admissions refer to the number of inmates admitted into the prison system during a given period of time. In this report, fiscal years run from July 1 to June 30. The following tables and charts will detail the characteristics of inmates who were admitted into Florida state prisons from July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017.

The majority of the inmates admitted to prison in FY 2016-17 were between the ages of 25-34 (36.2%).

Almost 49% of the inmates admitted during FY 2016-17 had served time in Florida state prison system before.

Those who enter prison today for a crime committed on or after October 1, 1995, will serve a minimum of 85% of their sentences.

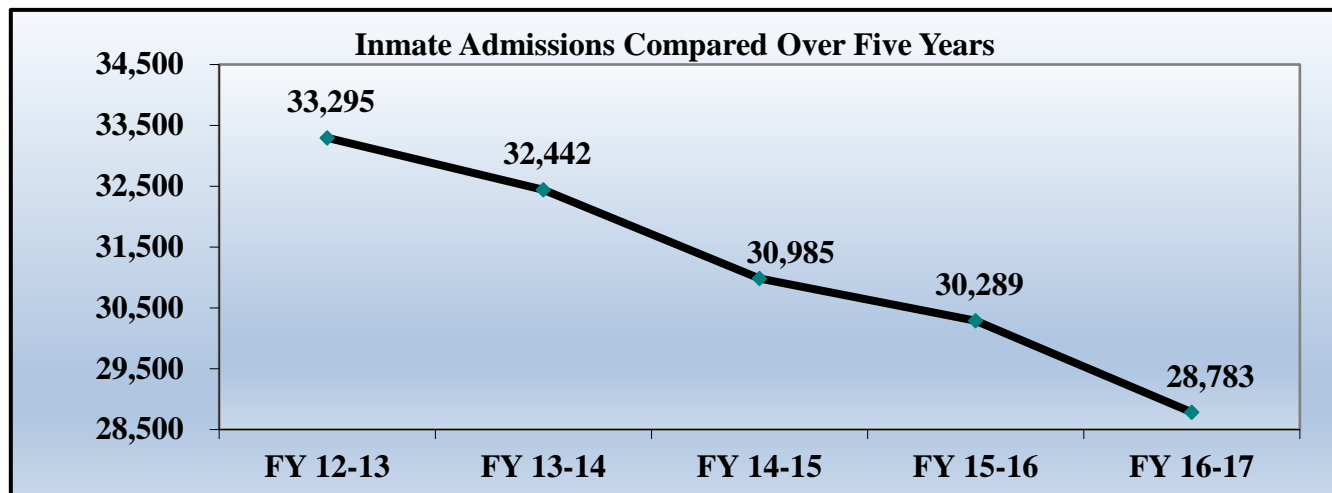
**Inmate Admissions Compared Over Ten Fiscal Years**

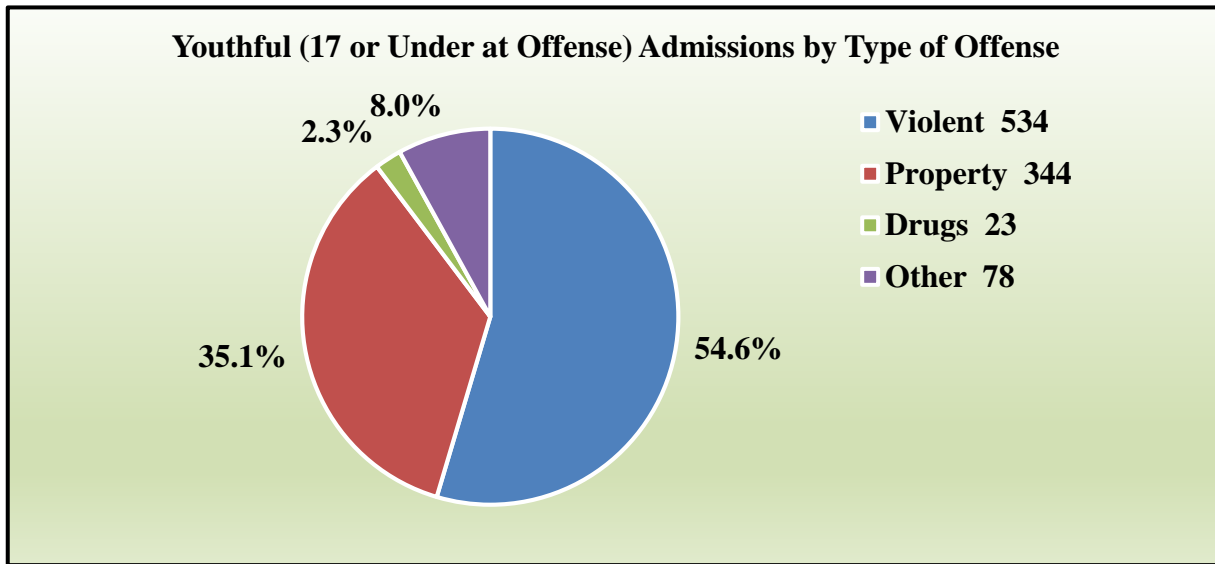

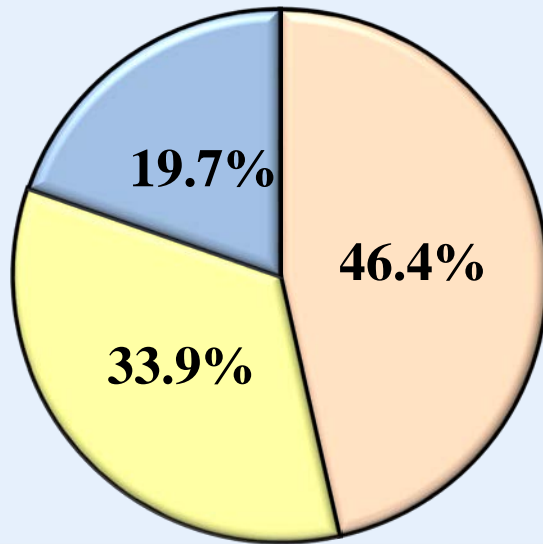

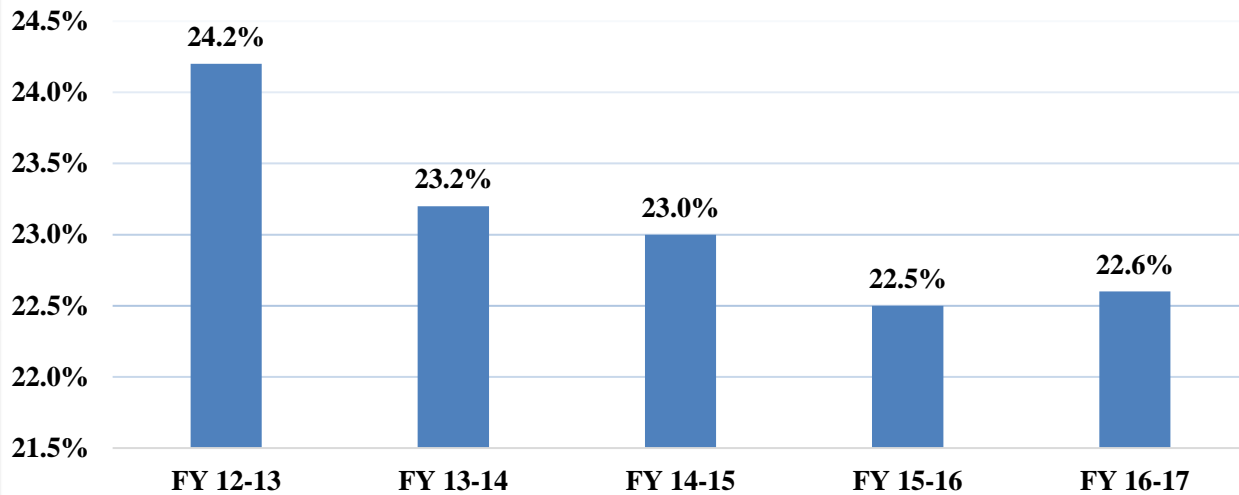


### Drug Offender Admissions FY 2016-17

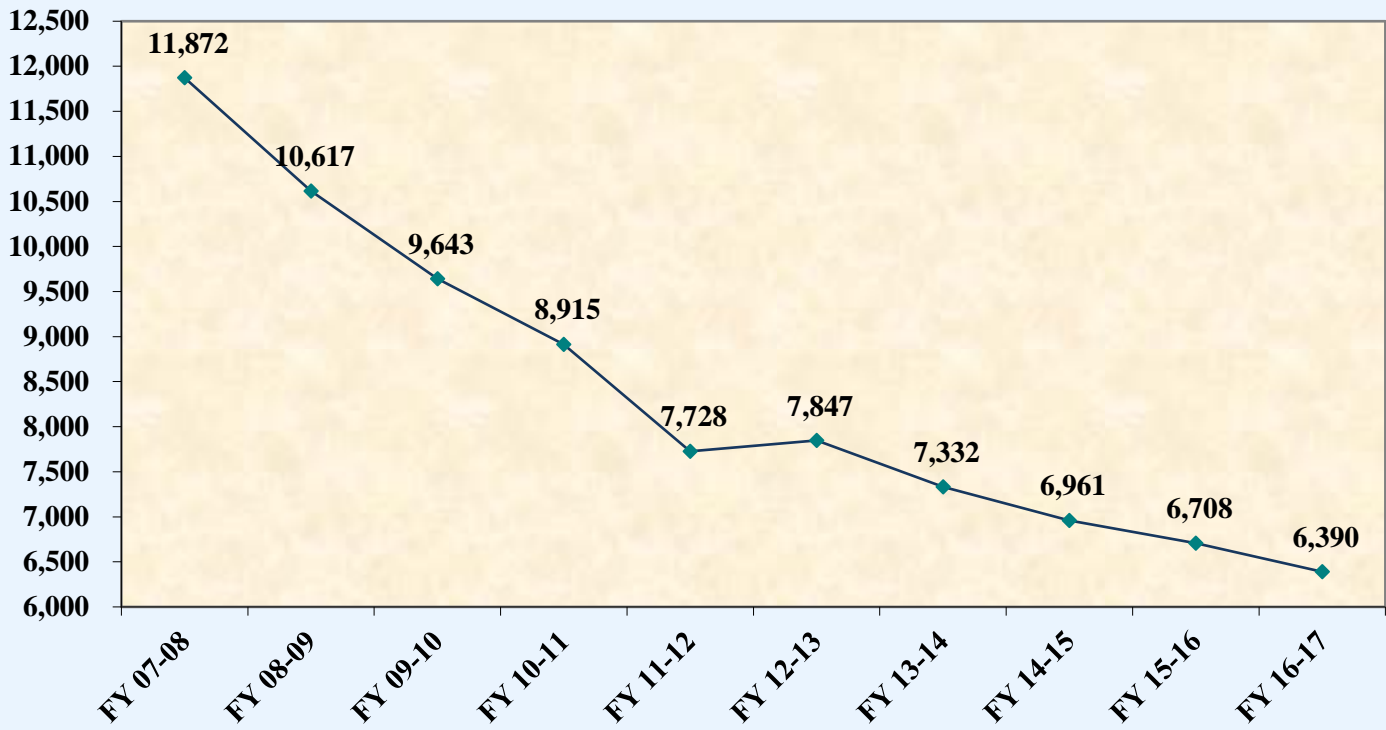

### Drug Offender Admissions Over Ten Years

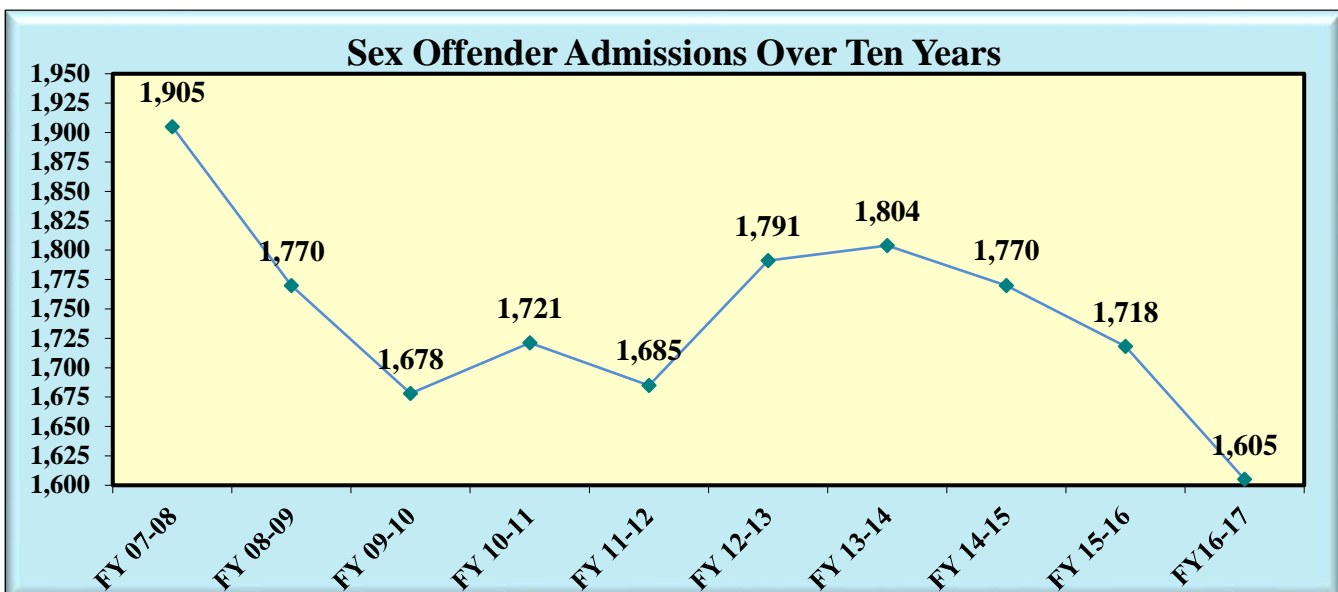

## Inmate Admissions

The term **prison admissions** refers to the **28,783** inmates who were sentenced by the courts and brought into the state prison system during the fiscal year. The admissions section of this report is focused exclusively on the characteristics of these individuals.

The **intakes** featured in this table are different from prison admissions in that they did not receive a new sentence when they were admitted into the prison system. They may have violated their terms of post-prison supervision, or returned from court without a new sentence, etc. This report does not focus at all on the **6,888** intakes brought into the prison system during this fiscal year, though it is important to note that these individuals are back in the system, albeit without new sentences. They are not included in current admissions because they were counted previously for their original admission.

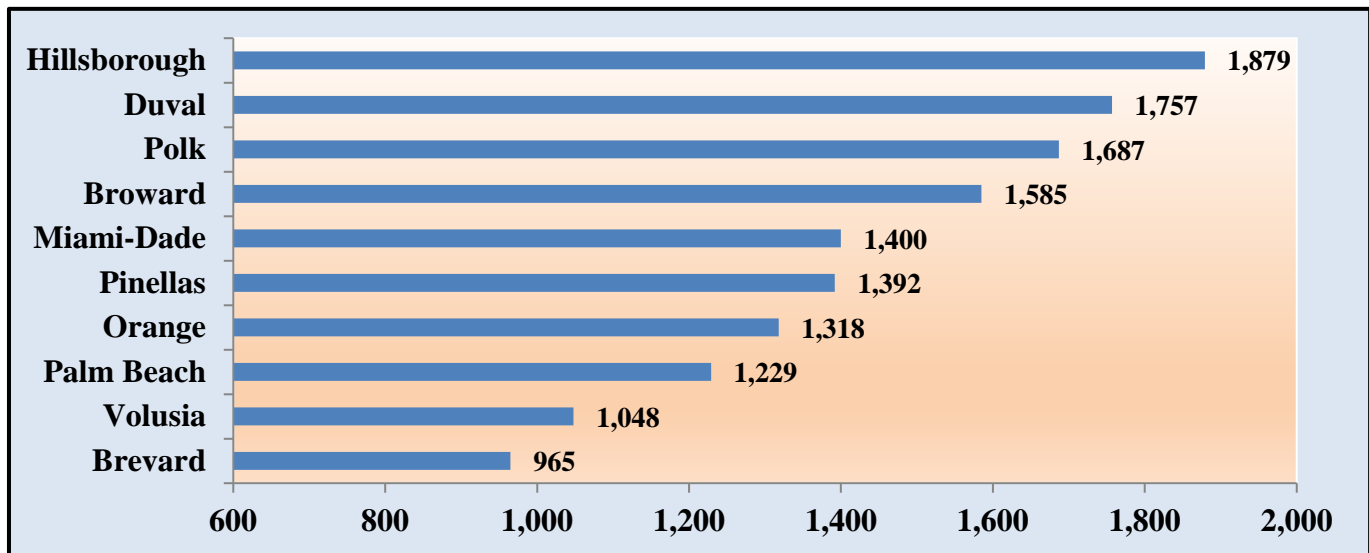

## Inmate Admissions

### Counties with Most Admissions in FY 2016-17



Felony cases are processed through judicial circuits. A circuit can consist of one large county (Circuit 11: Miami-Dade) or several smaller counties (Circuit 3: Columbia, Dixie, Hamilton, Lafayette, Madison, Suwannee, and Taylor counties). The county that an inmate is admitted from is generally the county in which the inmate committed his or her crime. Inmates are not necessarily incarcerated in or near the county where they committed their crime.

The top ten counties of admission, as shown above, provide approximately 51% of all prison admissions statewide. Accordingly, these were among the most populated counties in the state.

## Inmate Admissions

### Average Sentence Length for FY 2016-17 Admissions: 5.1 Years

The majority of those admitted to prison this fiscal year were sentenced to two years or less. The average sentence for everyone admitted to prison this fiscal year was **5.1** years. For calculation purposes, those sentenced to 50 years or longer, life, or death are coded as 50-year sentences.

Men who received death sentences are housed on death row at either Union Correctional Institution or Florida State Prison. Women on death row are located at Lowell Annex.

Anyone sentenced to prison today for a crime committed on or after October 1, 1995, will have served 85% of their sentence or more by the time they are released.

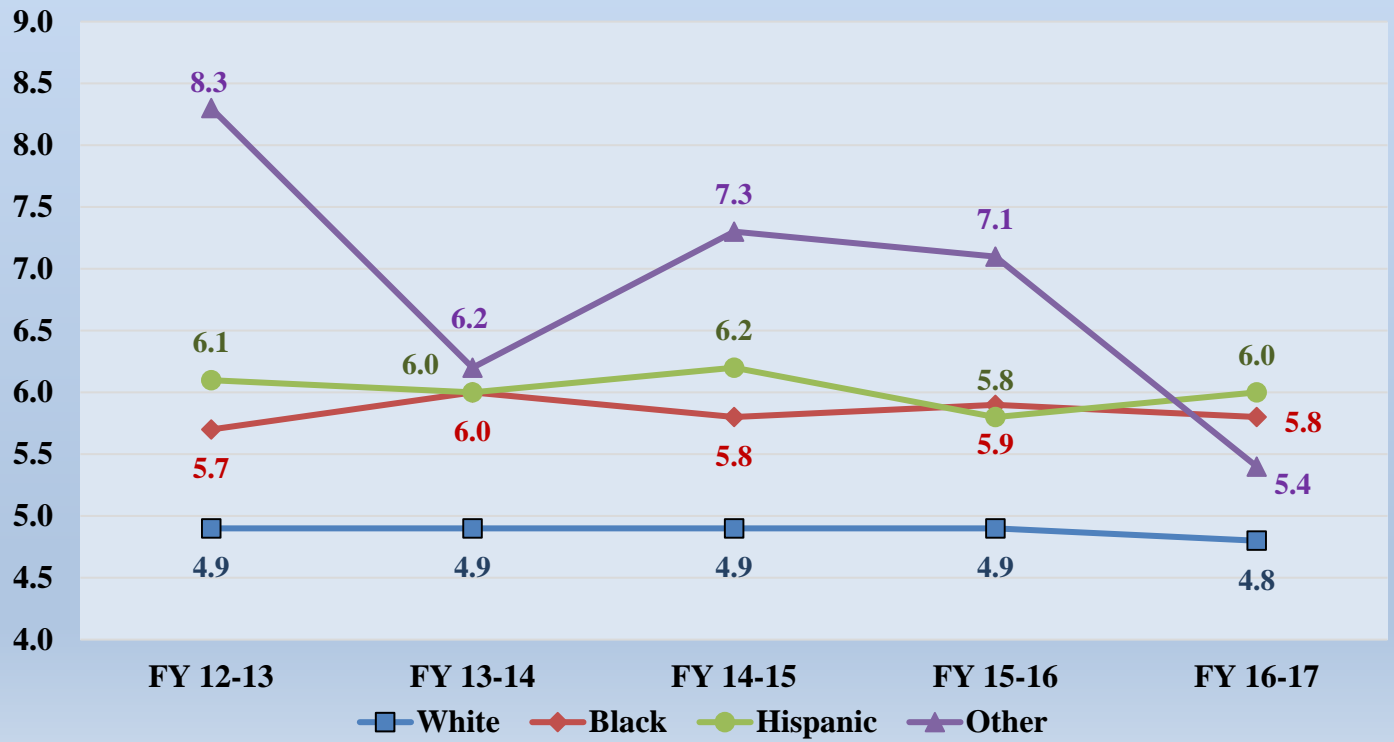

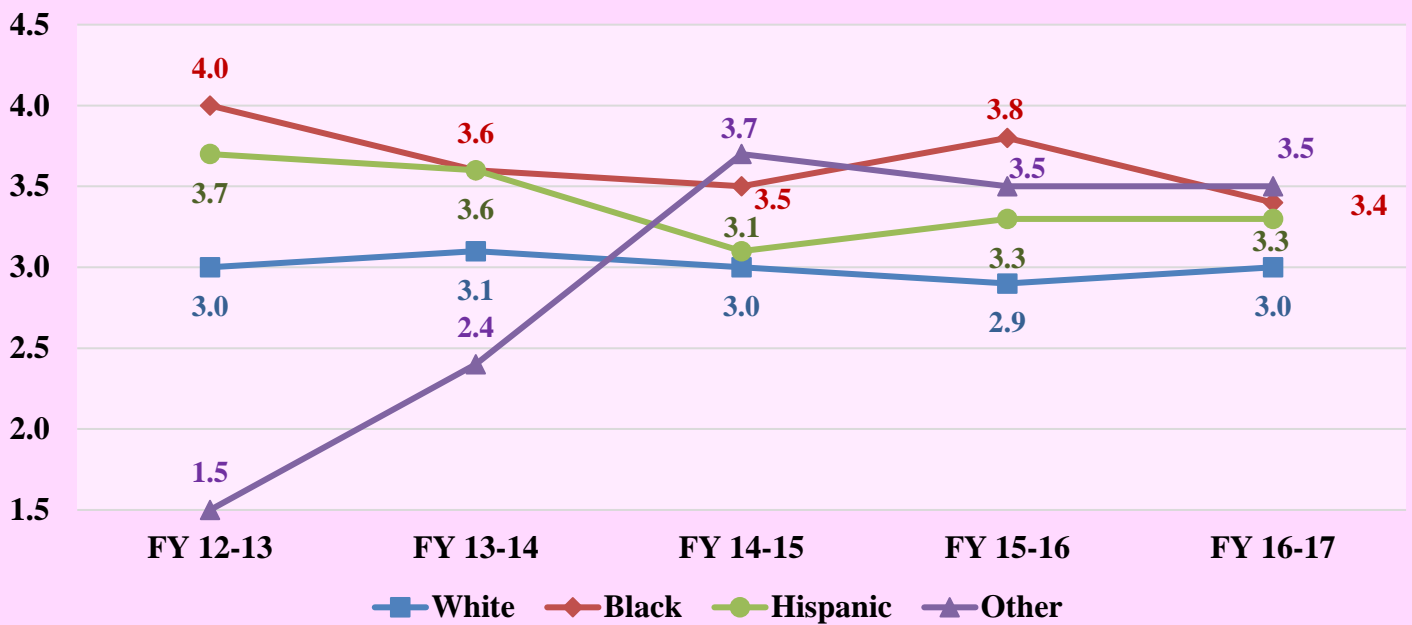

## Inmate Admissions

A **primary offense** is the most serious crime for which an inmate is admitted to prison, based on the statutory degree of the crime. It is called the primary offense because many inmates have multiple offenses for which they are being admitted to prison. For more information, refer to the section "**Introduction to Statistics.**"

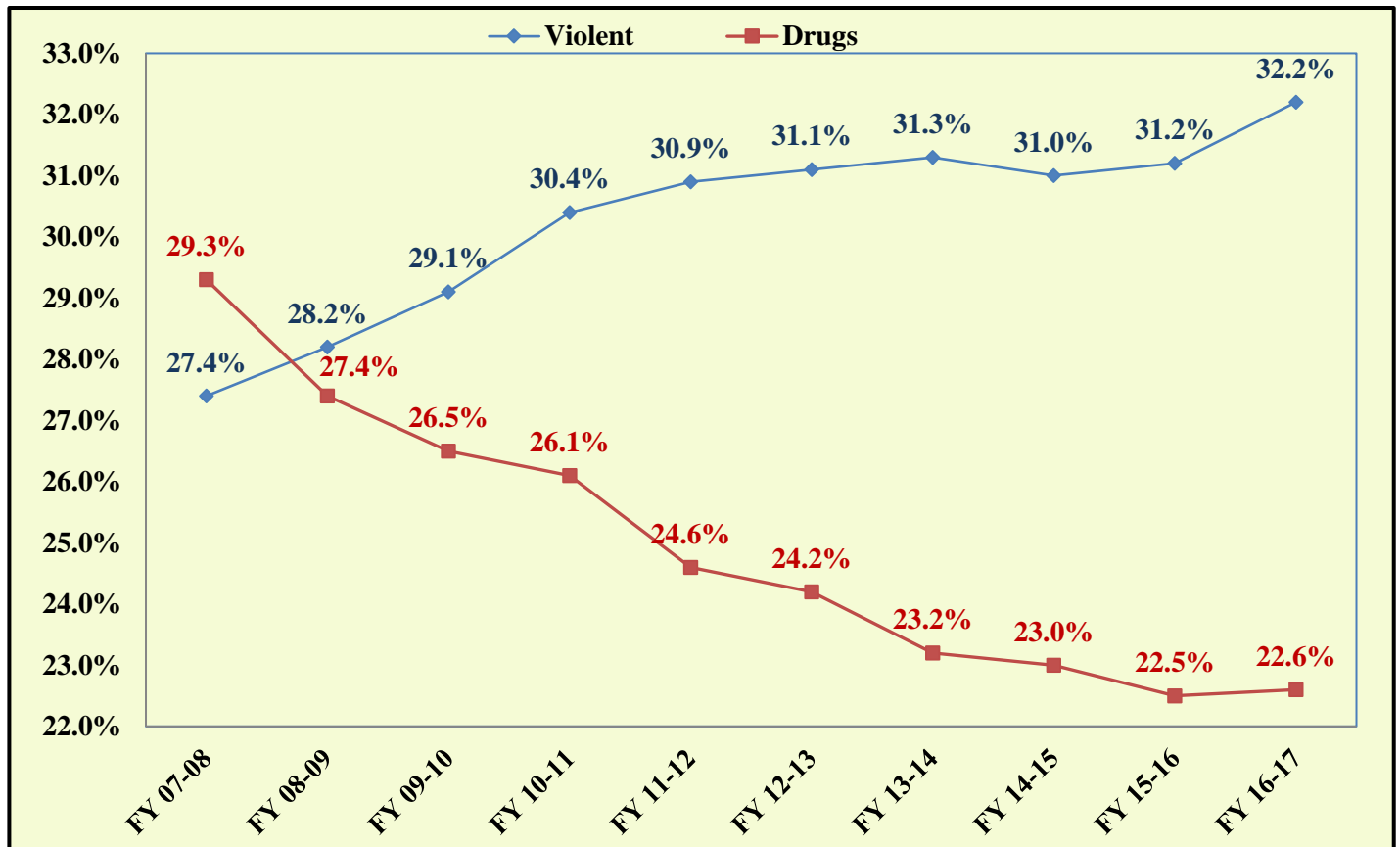
Almost a third (**32.2%**) of the offenses committed by those admitted to prison this fiscal year were for violent offenses, including murder, sexual assault, robbery, and "other violent offenses."

Convictions for the sale, manufacture, purchase, trafficking, and possession of drugs equaled **22.6%** of prison admissions.

Property crimes including burglary, theft, forgery, and fraud comprised approximately **30.6%** of prison admissions for FY 2016-17.

The "other" category, which includes racketeering, DUI, traffic, and other offenses comprised **14.7%** of admissions this fiscal year.

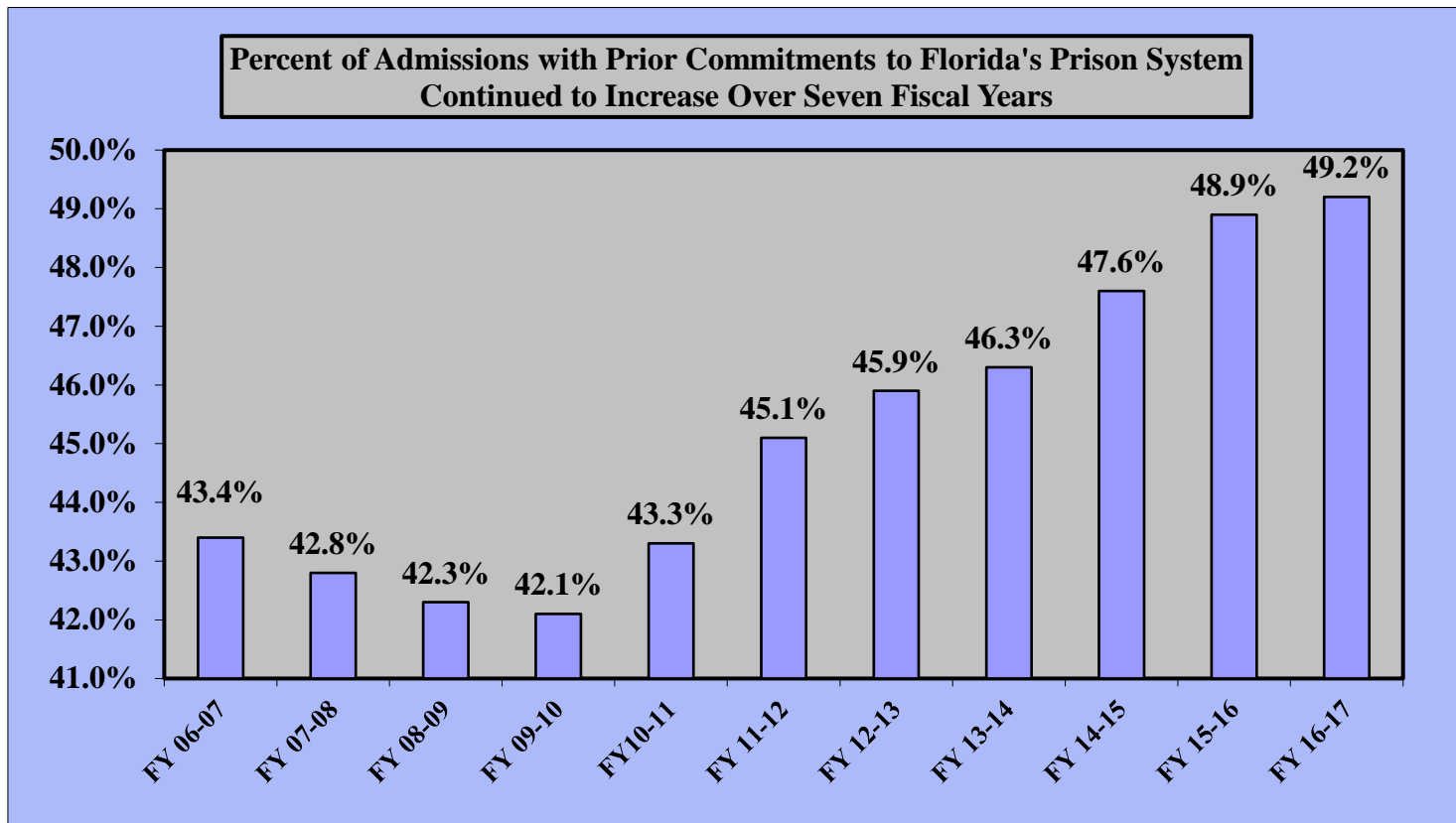

**Prior commitments** refers to any previous occasion that an inmate served time in the Florida prison system. This does not include supervision, such as probation. Nor does it include inmates who may have been in county jails in Florida, or in other state systems or in the Federal prison system.

Approximately 49.2% of the offenders who were admitted to the Florida prison system in FY 2016-17 had been in state prison in Florida before, and that number has continued to increase over the past five fiscal years.

During FY 2016-17, 22.8% of the offenders who were admitted to the Florida prison system had been in prison in Florida once previously. Approximately, 11.7% had been in twice previously, and 6.2% three times previously, with 8.5% of admissions having previously been in the Florida prison system four times or more.

In FY 2016-17, 66.7% of the female offenders had no previous Florida prison commitments, while 48.6% of male offenders had no previous Florida state prison commitments.





## Inmate Admissions

### Average Age of Prison Admissions: 34.8

The largest age group admitted to Florida's prisons remains the 20-25 (19.4%) category.

The elderly population, comprising of inmates age 50 and above, increased marginally from 12.6% last year to 12.8% for FY 2016-17.

In FY 2016-17, there were two 14 year olds admitted to the Department, both male. Their primary offenses were: murder/manslaughter and robbery.

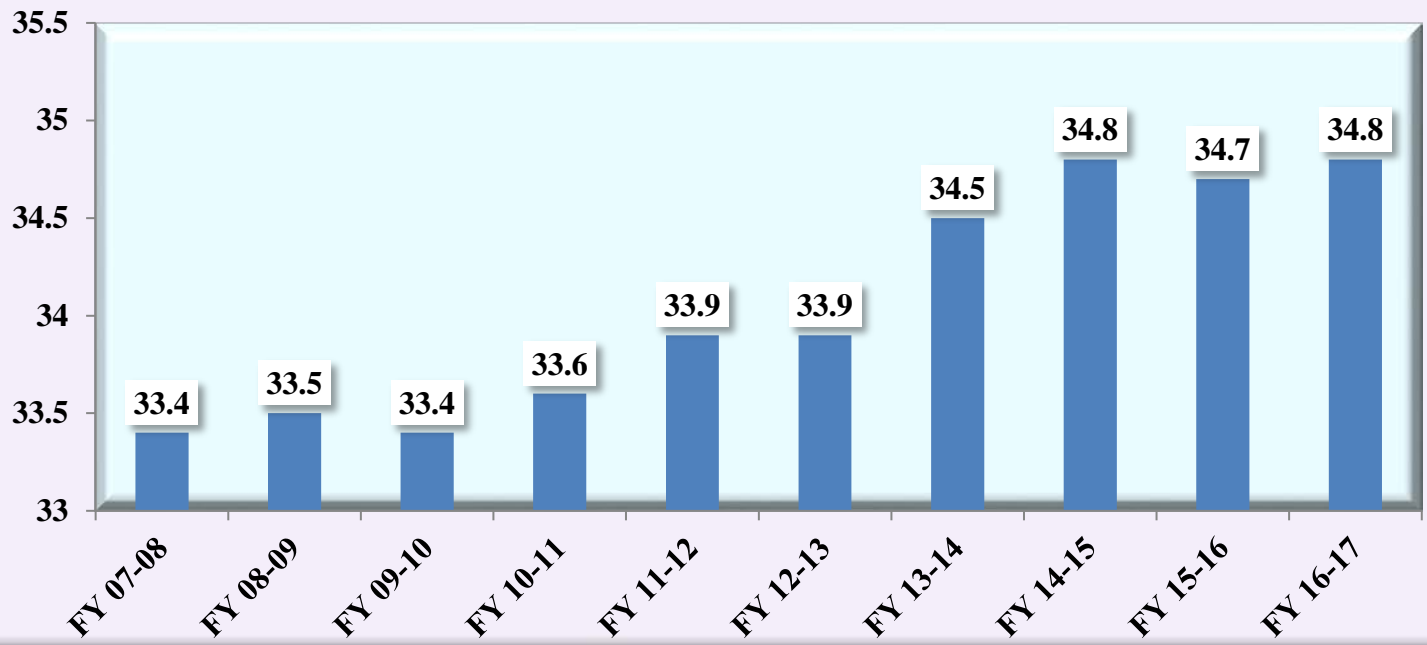
The oldest person admitted in FY 2016-17 was an 87 year old male, with a primary offense of murder/manslaughter.

The overall average age of females admitted during FY 2016-17, was 35.2 years of age, increasing slightly from last year and still a little higher than the overall male age of 34.6.
